# The Delinquency Problem -Jim Nation

This has been a very good year for the Society. Since our last meeting in Kyoto, we have received more than \$25,000 in contributions from Japanese firms, and more are continuing to come in. We owe a great debt of thanks to our President, Prof. Dr. Kenji Mori, for the outstanding job he has done for us among his Japanese colleagues. If you are attending the meeting in Tampa, please extend to him your personal thanks. These contributions have provided the Society with a nice cushion.

Our "active" membership continues to be very volatile. Our mailing list contains about 600 persons, including 62 who last paid dues in 1990, 56 who last paid in 1991, and 98 who last paid in 1992. Only 291 have paid their dues for 1993, and these include 41 new members. The Society has an additional 94 Life members. We **DUES RATES 1993** cannot afford to absorb the cost of long-term delinquent members and this is the last newsletter

What to do about the problem of "Dues Delinquency"? I think many people are simply unaware when they are late. To correct this we are currently printing the mailing label with the date of your last dues payment. The label, however, is usually put on an envelope, so don't throw the envelope in the trash before you check on your status! I would also like to encourage members to pay dues for up to 3 years in advance. This way you would receive dues notices less often and know that you have given long-term support to the Society. Unfortunately, however, we can not pay your Journal of Chemical Ecology subscriptions this way as these costs are less stable. I welcome your suggestions for building and maintaining our membership!



### Profile: Jeremy N. McNeil

Candidate for ISCE Vice-President/President Elect



Jeremy N. McNeil

Jeremy N. McNeil is Professor of Biology at Laval University in Quebec City, Canada where he has been since 1972. His formative years were spent in England and in Canada, and he received his Ph.D in Entomology from North Carolina State University. His research program for many years has centered around behavioral/ chemical ecology, principally in Lepidoptera. Specific

interests include pheromone communication systems and migration. He has authored/co-authored 115 papers in international journals, books and proceedings, and regularly is invited to give seminars and to speak in international symposia. At Laval he teaches courses on insect pest management and chemical ecology. He has trained 15 M.Sc. and 11 Ph.D graduates.

Dr. McNeil has received several awards and honors including the C. Gordon Hewitt Award (1979), Fellow (1981), and Gold Medal for Outstanding Achievement in Canadian Entomology (1987) from the Entomological Society of Canada. In 1990 he was awarded the Summa en Recherche by the Faculty of Science and Engineering at Laval University. He is presently on the Editorial Board of the Canadian Entomologist, Canadian Journal of Zoology, Chemoecology, and Entomologia Experimentalis et Applicata. He is a Past-President of the Entomological Society of Quebec, and of the Entomological Society of Canada. Currently he serves as President of the Canadian Federation of Biological Societies.

He has been a Life member of the ISCE since 1984, served as a Councilor (1987-1990), chaired the Student Travel Awards Committee (1989-1991), and was the local organizer for the joint ISCE/PSNA meeting in Quebec City in 1990. His hobbies include gardening, running, wine collecting, and snow shoveling. The interest in wine dates to an early foray in the wine business in England where he refused a permanent job on the grounds that he could never learn French!!! He maintains one of the most elaborate and interesting T-shirt collections in North America.



### Profile: John T. Romeo

John T. Romeo

John T. Romeo is Professor and Chairman of Biology at the University of South Florida in Tampa, Florida where he has been for 16 years. A Ph.D. in Botany from the University of Texas at Austin, his work is focused on nitrogen secondary compounds, particularly in tropical legumes. Among his specific research interests are: the role of nonprotein amino acids in biological interactions; plant/insect interactions in Florida salt marshes; and

allelopathy in the Florida scrub community. His work has been supported regularly by the National Science Foundation (Ecology, Systematics, and International Cooperative Programs), Partners for the Americas, and private corporations. He has done field work in Colombia, Ecuador, and Brazil.

At the University of South Florida he teaches courses in botany, biochemistry, and chemical ecology. He received the Outstanding Undergraduate Teaching Award from USF in 1990. He has supervised a number of graduate M.S. and Ph.D. students. He directed the Biology Graduate Program at USF from 1991-1992 and became Chair of the Department in 1992. He is a Past-Treasurer and Past-President of the Phytochemical Society of North America, and was recently named Editor-In-Chief of Recent Advances in Phytochemistry, a task he will assume in 1904.

He has been active in the ISCE since it's foundation having: compiled the first Membership Directory in 1985; served as Future Programs Chairman (1987-89); Councilor (1988-91); Secretary and Newsletter Editor (1990-93). He is the host and organizer for the 10th Annual ISCE meeting to be held in Florida in August. His outside interests include baseball, running, and NOT shoveling snow! He maintains an outstanding international collection of beer cans and barf bags.
