New Directory Published

The Third Edition of the International Society of Chemical Ecology Membership Directory has been completed. It replaces the last directory published in 1989. Martine Rowell-Rahier has completed the herculean task of gathering, editing and typing the information. By now you may have received your copy, but if not, you will be getting it soon. The reproduction, binding, and mailing were done by "Werkstatten und Wohnzentrum Basel Milchsuppe", an occupational therapy workshop for mentally and physically handicapped persons.

The Directory is divided into four parts: 1) The Society history, a list of previous meetings, officers, councilors, and the ISCE bylaws; 2) an alphabetical list of current mem-

bers 3) a geographical directory; and 4) a list of life members. The membership directory lists all members whose dues were current as of April, 1992. At this time we have 556 members from 33 different countries on 6 continents. This is an in-

crease of about 150 over the members listed in the 1989 Directory. We have not yet climbed back, however, to our membership peak of 691 reached in 1985, 2 years after the founding of the Society.

Reflecting the times of instant communication, in addition to telephone numbers, FAX numbers and electronic mail addresses are now included in the directory for a large number of members. You will note also that the by been made less sexist with "he" and "his" replaced by "he/she" and "his/her".

Profile: William H. Fenical

Candidate for ISCE Vice President/President-Elect

William Fenical is Professor of Oceanography at the University of California, San Diego and Director of the Marine Research Division at Scripps Institute of Oceanography, La Jolla, California. A Ph.D. in Organic Chemistry from University of California, Riverside, Dr. Fenical's work for many years has centered around marine natural products and their ecological roles. He has authored over 200 papers and publishes regularly in the Journal of Organic Chemistry, Journal of Agricultural & Food Chemistry, Tetrahedron Letters, Accounts of Chemical Research, Phytochemistry, Tetrahedron, Journal of Analytical Biochemistry, Journal of the American Chemical Society, Science, Limnology & Oceanography, Oecologia, Ecology, and Marine Ecology, Prog. Series.

He has received numerous awards and honors including acting as the elected Chairman of the 1986 Gordon Research Conference on Marine Natural Products Chemistry and the Vice Chairman of the 1992 Gordon Research Conference on Plant-Herbivore Interactions. He serves on the editorial boards of the <u>Journal of Natural Products</u> and <u>Marine Biotechnology and Molecular Biology</u>. He is a Member of the Bio-organic and Natural Products Study

Section of the National Institutes of Health, and is a Member of the Committee of Molecular Marine Biology, Ocean Studies Board of the National Research Council. He serves as a consultant to Pharmagenesis Inc., Sterling Drug Company, Ligand Pharmaceuticals, and B.F. Goodrich Company. Since 1987, he has been Chairman of the San Diego Bay Cleanup Committee, Regional Water Quality Board. He co-chaired the Second International Marine Biotechnology Conference in Washington in 1991, and is Organizer of the American Society of Pharmacognosy Annual Meeting to be held in San Diego in 1993.

Dr. Fenical is a Life Member of the ISCE. Titles of recent publications include: "Chemical Mediation of Seaweed-Herbivore Interactions"; "Defensive Properties of Secondary Metabolites from the Caribbean Gorgonian Coral <u>Erythropodium caribaeorum</u>"; "Specialist Herbivores Reduce their Susceptibility to Predation by Feeding on the Chemically Defended Seaweed <u>Avrainvillea longicaulis</u>"; "Seaweed Chemical Defenses: Among-Compound and Among-Herbivore Variance"; and "Symbiotic Marine Bacteria Chemically Defend Crustacean Embryos from a Pathogenic Fungus".

Profile: James L. Nation

Candidate for ISCE Treasurer

James Nation is Professor of Entomology and Nematology at the University of Florida, Gainesville where he has been for 30 years. A Ph.D. in entomology from Cornell University, his research interests have centered on insect physiology and biochemistry. More recently, he has concentrated on insect pheromones, particularly of the tephritid fruit flies and <u>Dendroctonus</u> sp. of bark beetles. His studies have been supported by the National Science Foundation, U.S. Forest Service,



Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Department of Agriculture, and the Florida Department of Citrus.

Dr. Nation is a Life Member of ISCE, and has served two 3-year terms as Treasurer. Titles of recent publications include: "Biology of Pheromone Release by Male Caribbean Fruit Flies, <u>Anastrepha suspensa</u>"; and "The Role of Pheromones in the Mating System of <u>Anastrepha</u> Fruit Flies".
